St Vincent appoints non-resident High Commissioner to Canada

OTTAWA, Canada – St Vincent and the Grenadines now has a High Commissioner to Canada. On Wednesday, September16, La Celia Prince presented credentials to Stephen Harper, prime minister of Canada. St Vincent and the Grenadines was last represented at the level of high commissioner to Canada by Brendon Browne, who served with concurrent responsibility for all OECS countries from 2007 until the closure of the OECS High Commission in September 2011.

In presenting her credentials, the high commissioner emphasized the value and importance that St Vincent and the Grenadines places on the relationship with Canada, thus the decision of the government of her country to reinstate diplomatic relations at that level, albeit via a non-resident high commissioner. Prince, whose substantive duties remain that of ambassador to the United States of America and permanent representative to the Organisation of American States, will continue to be based in Washington DC, while serving as non-resident high commissioner.

As with the consulate of St Vincent and the Grenadines in New York which falls under the jurisdiction of the embassy of St Vincent and the Grenadines in Washington DC, so too will the consulate of St Vincent and the Grenadines in Toronto, headed by Consul General Fitzgerald Huggins, fall under the purview of the office of the non-resident high commissioner.

During a one-day trip to Ottawa, Prince was also able to meet with representatives from the ministry of foreign affairs of Canada to discuss the mutual expectations and aspirations for the bilateral relationship between St Vincent and the Grenadines and Canada.



Meeting with Julia Wayand, deputy director for the Latin-America and Caribbean Division, and senior desk officer Daniel Bood, the high commissioner flagged St Vincent and the Grenadines' interest in securing greater trade opportunities with Canada, outside the framework of the current negotiations of the Canada-CARI-COM Free Trade Agreement (FTA), particularly via the vehicle of municipal chambers of commerce.

She also identified the need to have further and more elaborate engagement on Canadian immigration and deportation policies, as well as the visa restrictions to which St Vincent and the Grenadines is now subject.

For their part, the Canadian officials signalled an interest in facilitating dialogue between St Vincent and the Grenadines and several Canadian companies with expertise in renewable energy, who are particularly keen on working in the Eastern Caribbean. They indicated that the Canadian government and private sector have followed with keen interest, the policies and thrust of the government of St Vincent and the Grenadines on the question of renewable energy, and recognize the rich scope for collaboration between both countries in developing SVG's tremendous potential in the area of renewable energy. The officials also enquired about the level of recovery of St. Vincent and the Grenadines following the devastating Christmas trough of 2013.

SVGAT gives back!

Caribbean-SickKids Cancer and Blood Disorders Project

The information below was contributed by Marcia Farrell and includes excerpts from a publication titled: "SickKids Caribbean Initiative: Enhancing Capacity for Care in Paeditric Cancer and Blood Disorders"

The St. Vincent and Grenadines Association of Toronto join other Caribbean organizations and Consul General at the official launch on Thursday, February 14, 2013, for the Caribbean-SickKids paediatric Cancer and Blood Disorders Project, in an evening hosted by CTV News Andria Case.

The evening event were two-fold: An opportunity for Caribbean groups to discover how the Caribbean-SickKids Cancer and Blood Disorders Project would transformed the future for thousands of children and families who are faced with cancer and blood disorders across the Caribbean; and financial contributions towards their funding goal of \$8 million over five years.

In the Caribbean, paediatric concerns and serious blood disorders are often fatal because of a shortage of health-care professionals and resources to diagnose and treat children. Through a new outreach initiative, SickKids is working with six countries across the English-speaking Caribbean - The Bahamas, Barbados, Jamaica, St. Lucia, St. Vincent and the Grenadines, and Trinidad and Tobago - to improve outcomes for children affected by these devastating diseases.

SickKids visited participating countries to develop a strategy to address limitations after health experts in the Caribbean completed a needs assessment, indentifying gaps in their ability to accurately diagnose paediatric cancer types, participate in clinical research, and optimize outcomes. The gaps include:

- a lack of physicians with specialized training in paediatric cancer care
- limited technological resources, such as the resources required for immunophenotyping – sorting and differentiating cells- which is necessary for diagnosing leukemia
- a lack of front-line health-care providers, including nurses and pharmacists
- limited data on the effectiveness of treatments and the epidemiology of paediatric cancer in the region

Therefore, SickKids partnered with its Caribbean Colleagues and developed a fiveyear plan to address the region's gaps in research, care, and education in order to advance the diagnosis and management of paediatric cancer across the Caribbean. The plan includes the following components:

Education, patient Registry, paediatric Cancer and Blood Review Board, Diagnostic Services, Sickle Cell Anemia Programs, Service Delivery, and Research.

As mentioned earlier in my discourse the two-fold agenda at the launch included informing the audience and soliciting funds to help reduce the cost of the project. The impact of inequality between outcomes for children with cancer and serious blood disorders in Canada compared with those in the Caribbean is heartbreaking. From SickKids in Toronto, it is a five-hour plane ride to Vancouver, and only a four-hour trip to the Central Caribbean area, but the disparity between health prognoses in these two regions is profound.

The skills, resources, knowledge, and desire to reduce child mortality are at disposal of Sikkids. Together we will help to share this knowledge, to build collaborative solutions, and to make a difference in the lives of thousands of children. Thus, the Association took the initiative to share part of proceeds from its 2013 Independence Gala event to support this worthy cause.



On July 16, 2014 Marcia Farrell, president of the St. Vincent and Grenadines Association of Toronto, presented a cheque for \$2000.00 to Mr. Colin Hennigar Director of Major Gifts, at SickKids Hospital and Dr. Melanie Kirby. The funds go towards the SickKids Carribean Initiative Cancer and Blood Disorder Project.

Immigration Matters

NEW CITIZENSHIP ACT MAKES IT HARDER TO ACQUIRE CITIZENSHIP

A new Citizenship Act became law in Canada in June 2014. Some changes that took effect on August1, 2014 includes giving Citizenship and Immigration Canada stronger authority to define what constitutes a complete application package, the type and nature of evidence applicants must provide, and which applications shall be deemed as abandoned and should be closed. If an applicant fails to comply with any request to provide information or attend an interview at any point after processing of the application has commenced up to and until the Citizenship oath is taken his/her application may be deemed to be abandoned and thus closed.

The following are some of the changes that are slated to come into effect in June 2015:

Health Benefits of Breadfruit

- ❖ As in line with other tropical fruits, breadfruit too holds lots of calories. 100 g fresh fruit provides 102 calories. The major fraction of this comes from the carbohydrates. Ripe fruits are sweeter since their starch content is converted into sucrose and simple sugars like fructose and glucose.
- ▼ Its pulp has more fiber than in jackfruit, which makes it a good bulk laxative. Dietary fiber helps reduce blood cholesterol by preventing its absorption in the gut, reduce obesity, blood pressure and help protect the colon mucous membrane by warding off cancer-causing chemicals from the colon.
- ▼ It has small amounts of flavonoid anti-oxidants in the form of xanthin and luein. Yellow-orange varieties have more of these compounds.
- ▼ Breadfruit has more vitamin-C than jackfruit, and banana, provides about 29 mg or 48% of RDA. Vitamin-C (ascorbic acid) is a strong water-soluble antioxidant. Consumption of fruits rich in the vitamin C help body develops resistance against infectious agents and scavenges harmful free radicals.
- The fruit has moderate levels of essential vitamins, and minerals. Like other tropical delicacies, it is rich in many vital B-complex groups of vitamins. The fruit is a moderate source of vitamins, especially thiamin, pyridoxine, and niacin.
- Fresh fruit is an excellent source of potassium. Potassium is an important component of cell and body fluids that help regulate heart rate and blood pressure. Its pulp is good in copper, iron, magnesium, and phosphorus.

Breadfruit Layer Casserole

Ingredients:

- 1 lb minced meat
- 2 lbs spinach or callaloo leaves
- 1 lb onions sliced
- 1 lb sweet pepper sliced
- 4 blades chive chopped
- 3 stalks celery chopped
- 3 stalks parsley chopped
- 1 quart (32 fl. ozs.) water

- 1 small head of garlic grated
- 2 tsp. paprika
- 2 tsp. white pepper
- 1 small piece ginger grated
- 2 small or 1 large breadfruit
- 1 16 oz. can tomato paste
- 1 oz. margarine

Method:

- 1. Season, cook and set aside ground meat.
- 2. Cook spinach in small amount of water (callaloo longer) and set aside.
- 3. Combine onions, sweet pepper, chive, celery and parsley.
- 4. Make a sauce by adding tomato paste to measured water. Add garlic, paprika, white pepper and ginger. Simmer for 3-4 minutes then remove from heat and set aside
- 5. Peel and thinly slice breadfruit
- 6. Pour 1/2 cup sauce in greased deep baking dish and arrange a layer of sliced breadfruit in dish
- 7. Add some meat and seasoning (celery, chive etc.)
- 8. Arrange a second layer of breadfruit followed by spinach/callaloo, meat and seasoning.
- 9. Add a third layer of breadfruit and arrange pepper and onion rings on top. Pour over remaining sauce.
- 10. Cover dish and cook in a hot oven 475 degrees until breadfruit is tested done.

Community Happenings

A Movie Night to Remember

Vincentian-Canadians who attended the screening of the film Yuromein that was featured at the Caribbean Tales International Film Festival this past September, learned a lot more of the history of St. Vincent and the Grenadines (SVG). Yuromein, which means homeland, tells the story of the Caribs and Garufunas of SVG and their resistance against slavery. The Caribs are the aboriginal people of SVG and Garufunas are decendants of the mixed marriages between the Caribs and slaves from West Africa. The film opens with a Vincentian Carib from Sandy Bay who is now a practising doctor in Los Angeles visiting SVG and decided to research his roots as much as he can. The film weaved the story of how the Caribs came to the island, were persecuted by the Colonialists, driven away to Balliceau, a small island off St. Vincent where hundreds died of starvation and hundreds more went into exile to central America and in particular to Belize. The film depicted the Garufuna culture that is very much alive and flourishing in Belize. It highlighted the visit of a group of Garunfunas to Balliceau in recent years to stand where their ancestors stood many years ago and to mourn their loss. Theatre goers were given first hand accounts from Caribs in St. Vincent who spoke of their memories or lack of memories of their culture and the need to keep the culture alive. Yuromein was written and produced by Andrea L. Leland, a professor in the Caribbean Studies department at the University of Toronto. Yuromein is a film that every Vincentian should see.

Nostalgia

On Saturday, September 20th, Vincentians were treated to an evening of culture that, by all accounts, would be fondly remembered in the community as the Concert of 2014. Billed as "Nostalgia" MC, E. B.
